

Biography

Ningura Naparrula was born around 1938 in Watulka, south of Kiwirkurra, Northern Territory. Ningura Napurrula is the widow of the famous Papunya artist Yala Yala Gibbs. Ningura was represented at the ARCO Art Fair 2002 in Spain and in the same year won the prestigious Alice Prize. Ningura Naparrula began painting in the 90s and with Naata Nungurrayi is one of the founders of the 'Pintupi Painting Women' movement from Kintore. Her most impressive work is large in size and often executed in two colors (usually black and white or red and white). Her work stands out for its sharp patterns in which white dots form a delicate linear web where the dark background shines through. This gives the illusion that the dark surface forms the upper layer of paint, which gives her paintings a spectacular perspective. She paints with a refinement and detail that is exceptional for Aboriginal Art. Ningura is also a member of the Papunya Tula Artists collective. Since motifs from her work were included in the architecture of the 2006 opening of the Musée du Quai Branly in Paris, her work has become popular worldwide.

Ningura Napurrula was born around 1938 in Watulka south of Kiwirkurra, Northern Territory. Ningura Napurrula was a young woman in her mid-twenties when she took her first journey out of the Gibson Desert in 1962 to Papunya with the Northern Territory Welfare Branch patrol. After their son received medical treatment at Papunya, Napurrula and her husband Yala Yala Gibbs Tjungurrayi were transported by another patrol back to their own country, close to the present day site of Kiwirrkura. The following year, Napurrula and Tjungurrayi walked back to Papunya with their whole family group as part of a general migration of Pintupi people from their country.

Ningura Naparrula (Indigenous Australian, ca. 1938 - 2013)

Yala Yala Gibbs Tjungurrayi became one of the founders of Papunya Tula Artists in the early 1970s, and one of the exponents of the classic Tingari painting style that dominated Pintupi men's painting until the early 1990s. In the 1980s, the family moved back to the newly established Pintupi township of Walungurru (Kintore), then to Muntarti outstation in Western Australia, before returning to Walungurru. Here, Napurrula and Tjungurrayi's other two wives began assisting Tjungurrayi in infilling the backgrounds of his canvases with the meticulous, precisely placed dots that characterised the Tingari style.

Napurrula first painted in her own right in 1995, in the second year of the Haasts Bluff/Kintore women's painting project. Following Tjungurrayi's death in 1998, her painting activity increased dramatically. Her bold, intricate linework and dense monochrome infilling – as seen in Untitled (Wirrulnga), 2000 – are reminiscent of Tjungurrayi's earliest works. Wirrulnga is an important women's rockhole site east of Kiwirrkura. Napurrula's work is strongly charged with the seriousness of women's business, echoed in the distinctive paintings of fellow Papunya Tula Artists, Makinti Napanangka and Inyuwa Nampitjinpa. Napurrula and Tjungurrayi's sons, Morris Gibson Tjapaltjarri (Mawitji) and Adam Gibbs Tjapaltjarri, now carry on their mother's and father's work in their own paintings.

Her most impressive work is large in size and often done in two colors (usually black and white or red and white). Het work stands out for its sharply executed patterns in which white dots form up a delicate linear game where the dark background shines through. This gives the illusion that the dark surface forms the upper layer of paint, which gives her paintings a spectacular perspective. She paints with refinement and detail that is exceptional for Aboriginal Art and her finest work shows an unprecedented determination. Niagara is also a member of the Papunya Tula Artist collective. Since motifs from her work were included in the architecture of the in 2006 opened Musée de Quai Branly in Paris, her work is very popular worldwide. We are very lucky to have some of her work complementing our collection. Niagara exhibits continuously in numerous renowned galleries across Australia and held a number of successful solo exhibitions.
