

Miroslav Tichý (Czech, 1926 - 2011)

Biography

Originally a student at Prague's Academy of Fine Arts, Miroslav Tichý was regarded as a promising modernist painter. However, with the establishment of Communist rule in 1948, the authorities insisted that students conform to Social Realist styles. Tichý refused, leaving the academy, though the regime kept him under surveillance and made several attempts to "rehabilitate" him, including forcing brief stays in psychiatric facilities. In the 1950s, Tichý shifted his focus to photography, creating an array of crude homemade cameras. His hometown became his studio, with female figures as his primary subjects, much like in a traditional life-drawing class.

Using his homemade cameras, the enigmatic Czech artist photographed women around Kyjov, Czech Republic, for many years. Between the 1950s and 1986, Tichý took thousands of discreet photographs in and around the town. Known for his disheveled appearance and eccentric lifestyle, locals regarded him as a harmless oddity, though his work can be seen as a subtle act of defiance against the totalitarian regime.

Harald Szeemann, the first curator to show an interest in Tichý, noted, "The more you look, the less naïve it becomes; when you listen to what he says, he clearly enjoys breaking all the rules, without caring about the outcome."

Despite aspiring to traditional photographic values like composition and contrast, imperfections were central to Tichý's work. "The flaws are part of it," he said. "That's the poetry. To achieve that, you need a bad camera." He built his devices from scrap materials like cardboard tubes and tin cans, sealed with tar, and powered by bobbins and dressmaker's elastic. He crafted lenses from plexiglass and even made his own telephoto lens. His negatives were often marred by dust or processing errors. After printing, he would trim the images, draw lines to emphasize contours, decorate the borders, and mount his favorite images on cardboard. Christie's specialist Amanda Lo Iacono noted, "These chance encounters, fleeting moments captured on film, have a distinct Baudelairean charm. What captivates us today is how Tichý embodied the quintessential flâneur, blending his art with his way of life."



In 2005, Tichý's work won the New Discovery Award at the Arles photography festival. His life and artistic approach have influenced notable artists such as Thomas Ruff, Jonathan Meese, Fischli & Weiss, and musician Michael Nyman. Roman Buxbaum, a former neighbor, established the Tichý Oceán Foundation to promote his work, helping to secure exhibitions at prestigious venues like the Pompidou Centre in Paris and the Kunsthaus Zurich.

Tichý's reputation continued to rise, particularly with a 2009 solo exhibition at New York's International Center of Photography, his first in North America, which was titled after the documentary *Miroslav Tichý: Tarzan Retired*.

Tichý had little interest in preserving or organizing his work. For years, he left his photographs scattered around his home, untitled and uncatalogued. This changed in 1981 when Roman Buxbaum returned from exile in Switzerland and began collecting and preserving Tichý's work. "For a long time, I was the only person he shared his photographs with," Buxbaum recalled. "We would go through them together, and he would give me this one or that one, based on what I liked."

Buxbaum's efforts to gain wider recognition for Tichý culminated in the 2004 release of the documentary *Miroslav Tichý: Tarzan Retired*. That same year, Harald Szeemann entered Tichý's work into the Biennial of Contemporary Art in Seville, likening his style to that of German photorealist painter Gerhard Richter. The following year, Tichý's work won the New Discovery Award at Arles.

Tichý passed away in 2011 at the age of 84, but his art continues to provoke questions about content, form, and the process of creation.
